^{*}The OBR forecast was £520m but this is the amount that HM Treasury and Department for Education confirmed was passed to the 2018/19 DfE departmental budget that related to SDIL revenues, in an email sent to the Local Government Association from Liz Kendall at the Department for Education, 16 Sept 2019.

In March 2019, the OBR revised the forecast to £340m per year, and this is close to what the SDIL raised in 2019/20 (£336m). The latest OBR forecasts continue to predict around £0.3billion revenues from SDIL until 2024.

In the 2019 Spending Round, HM Treasury confirmed that the 2016 CSR promise had been rolled over. In the 2020 Spending Round, they have not made a similar statement for 2021-22 departmental allocations, so we base the 2021 figure on the income the SDIL has actually raised in the last full financial year.
